

TITLE I COMPONENTS



Title I Components

Each year the school completes a School Improvement Plan (SIP). The plan includes input from parents, teachers, community members, and other stakeholders and consists of sections such as a needs assessment, teacher qualifications, achievement goals, and parental involvement. The school makes this plan available to all parents. All parents are encouraged to review the SIP by 1) visiting the school's website, or 2) requesting the school's office for a copy of the plan.

The School Improvement Plan includes the school's goals which are parallel to the system's goal. The plan lists these objectives along with strategies and activities that will aid in the implementation of the goals.

Annual Title I meetings are held at the school at flexible times to inform parents of requirements regarding the Schoolwide Program and to seek input regarding the School Improvement Plan, School Parental Involvement Policy and Plan, and the Student Compact,

ACADEMIC PROGRESS REPORTING

Students receive a progress report every 4.5 weeks of instruction.

If your child receives additional student services (SPED, Speech, ESL, etc.) these reports will come with your child's report card each nine weeks. Students who are receiving academic support through Response to Instruction and Intervention (RTI2) will receive notification as needed per the student's progress in the program.

STUDENT CONDUCT (POLICY #6022)

Prevention and Intervention Strategies- The district shall develop and communicate a comprehensive prevention and intervention program. The program shall include a parental engagement component outlining strategies for parents to support the prevention of inappropriate and/or disruptive behavior in their children and participate in intervention efforts if such behavior occurs. Additionally, prevention and intervention strategies may include classroom, school-wide, or district-wide assessment and supports for students who exhibit and/or are victims of behaviors involving threats; poor attendance/truancy; violence/weapons/gangs; drugs/alcohol; or harassment/intimidation/ bullying/cyber- bullying.

TENNESSEE LEARNING LOSS REMEDIATION AND STUDENT ACCELERATION ACT (3RD GRADE COMMITMENT)

Rising 3rd Grade Students Focus: "Accelerating Student Learning"

"Beginning with the 2022-2023 school year, a student in the **third grade** <u>shall not</u> <u>be promoted to the next grade level</u> unless the student is determined to be proficient in English Language Arts (ELA) based on the student's achieving a performance level rating of <u>"on track</u>" or <u>"mastered</u>" on the ELA portion of the student's most recent Tennessee comprehensive assessment program (TCAP) test."

MANDATORY TUTORING FOR "APPROACHING STUDENTS"

• The student attends a learning loss bridge camp before the beginning of the 2023- 2024 school year, maintains a ninety percent (90%) attendance rate at the camp, and the student's performance on the post-test administered to the student at the end of the learning loss bridge camp, demonstrates adequate growth, as defined in the State Board's Promotion and Retention Policy 3.300;

OR

• The student receives high-dosage, low-ratio tutoring for the entirety of the 2023-2024 school year from a Tennessee accelerating literacy and learning corps (TALLC) tutor. For the purposes of this rule, "high-dosage, low-ratio tutoring" means a minimum of two (2) thirty (30) minute sessions per week with a one to three (1:3) teacher to student ratio. Our tutoring will be completed in house with our faculty and staff.

MANDATORY TUTORING "BELOW STUDENTS"

- The student attends a learning loss bridge camp before the beginning of the 2023-2024 school year and maintains a ninety percent (90%) attendance rate at the camp, and receives high-dosage, low-ratio tutoring for the entirety of the upcoming school year.
- For the purposes of this rule, "high-dosage, low-ratio tutoring" means a minimum of two (2) thirty (30) minute sessions per week with a one to three (1:3) teacher to student ratio. Tutoring will be completed in house by our faculty and staff.

NEW ADDITIONS TO THE LAW

Beginning with the 2023-2024 school year, a student who is <u>retained in any of the grades</u> <u>kindergarten through three (K-3) must be assigned a tutor</u> to provide the student with tutoring services for the entirety of the upcoming school year.

ATTENTION CURRENT 3RD GRADE PARENTS!!!!!

Beginning with the 2023-2024 school year:

- Students must demonstrate proficiency in ELA standards based on the student's scoring within the fiftieth (50%) percentile on the most recently administered state-provided benchmark assessment;
- If the benchmark assessment is administered to the student in a test environment, as determined by the department, and the student's LEA or public charter school agrees to provide tutoring services to the student for the entirety of the student's fourth-grade year.
- If a student is promoted to the fourth grade, then the student's LEA or public charter school shall notify the student's parent or guardian, in writing, of the benefits of enrolling their student in a learning loss bridge camp and encouraging the parent or guardian to do so;

APPEAL PROCESS FOR APPROACHING STUDENTS IN 3RD GRADE

- Based on the student's achieving a performance level rating of "approaching" on the ELA portion of the student's most recent TCAP test. The rules must provide, for the 2023-2024 school year and each school year thereafter:
- A. That if an appeal is filed, the filing must be made by the student's parent or guardian unless the student's parent or guardian consents, in writing, to a principal, guidance counselor, teacher, or other administrator of the student's school filing the appeal, in which case the appeal may be filed by such individual;

and

• B.The process by which a principal, guidance counselor, teacher, or other administrator of the student's school must obtain the written consent of a student's parent or guardian for purposes of filing an appeal on behalf of the student's parent or guardian.



2023 – 2024 School Year

A student who is promoted to the 4th grade <u>must</u> show adequate growth on the fourth (4th) grade ELA portion of the TCAP test as further defined in State Board Promotion and Retention Policy 3.300 <u>before</u> <u>the student may be promoted to the fifth (5th) grade</u>.
